Foreword To Annual Report 2022

The fiscal year 2022 was an extraordinary and challenging year in many ways. Despite all the difficulties, the Shuhada Organization (SO) reached out to around 0.3 million people in need and provided them with quality services in various sectors.

We are happy to present the Annual Report of the Shuhada Organization (SO) for the year 2022 here.

The report provides a detailed overview of SO activities completed during the mentioned period, how the fund was used, and how the needy people were supported in different rural areas of Afghanistan.

More than a year after the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan (IEA), commonly known as the (IEA)/de facto authorities took power, it prompted the international donors to suspend most of the non-humanitarian aid and to freeze billions of dollars.

The Afghans went through a harsh situation due to the devastating effects of economic collapse.

However, fortunately a rapid increase in humanitarian aid funding prevented famine last winter and nearly 10 million Afghans gained access to health and nutrition services, preventing the worst from happening.

However, these actions did not deal with the problems underlying causes.

The international community has not come to an agreement on a strategy to deal with



Afghanistan's economic collapse despite efforts to get engage with de facto authorities.

As families getting ready for another long winter, nearly the whole population is currently living in poverty.

According to Georgetown University's Women, Peace, and Security Index Afghanistan is ranked last globally for women's inclusion, justice, and security.

The (IEA) have made it illegal for women to work for NGOs, hold political office, or attend university.

These prohibitions, together with dress codes and travel limitations, severely marginalised Afghan women and aid in their exclusion from public life.

The country's capacity to reconstruct will be severely harmed by the bans. Without female employees, NGOs cannot help those in need fully. As a result, most of the NGOs have stopped working in Afghanistan for the first time since 1988.

Despite the many uncertainties in the country, psychological, social unrest and a deterioration in the rule of law have led to an increase in human rights violations, particularly against women and children, and serious consequences after the fall of Afghanistan in August 2021.

There are socio-economic challenges, having made an impact on the country during the reporting period, SO not only successfully implemented planned projects in different parts of the country but also provided emergency humanitarian assistance to many Afghan families.

The SO remains dedicated to providing a significant contribution in the many key areas of humanitarian and development interventions, as in previous years.

Being a part of the Afghan civil society, SO took advantage of every chance to spread its values of equality and human rights throughout larger organizational networks in order to better serve the needs of the local population and to strengthen the rule of law and access to justice. I sincerely thank all of SO's donor and partners for continuing to provide generous support and for being interested in maintaining their confidence and engagement with SO despite the fact that the situation has altered.

We would like to thank the Help Committee Schaffhausen (HCS), Comitato Arghosha Faraway School (CAFS), Partner Relief and Development (Partners), Feminist Majority Foundation (FMF), Barefoot College International (BCI), Focus Women Foundation (FWF), World Health Organization (WHO), Agency Coordinating Body for Afghan Relief (ACBAR) and Department for International Development (DFID).

I also want to express my sincere gratitude to SO's executive team, board members, and diligent field personnel, who have made significant contributions to carrying out the initiatives on the ground. As previously mentioned, the humanitarian crises which Afghan people are facing is significant and need our collective committment, and sustained assistance, especially from our donor friends and community. In collaboration with you all, SO continued to provide the critical humanitarian aid which was required to be met and to overcome this year's challenges.

The cooperation principles, as well as honoring its ideals, remain important to SO.

The Shuhada organization remains committed to realizing the vision, objectives, and goals outlined in its strategic plans, and will continue to brief its respected donors on the successes, obstacles, and gaps on a regular basis.

I hope this report helps you to better understand the activities of our organization and its accomplishments.

More importantly, I hope you comprehend the difficulties and dilemmas we face daily as we meet our obligations to help those in need and show our accountability to both our funders and the beneficiaries, who are the sole reason we exist.







SO Geographical Coverage





HEALTH



This organization has provided health facilities for a number of 5,847,132 individuals since its establishment where 232,366 individuals (female: 139,420 – male: 92,946) have been provided health services in 2022.

Health

Afghanistan has served as a battleground for both domestic and foreign forces since many years. Women and children are most at risk in rural areas, where living conditions are terribly challenging. Over the past 20 years, Afghanistan has made significant strides in expanding access to healthcare services and raising several health indicators.

"The state shall provide free preventative healthcare and treatment of diseases, as well as medical facilities to all citizens in accordance with the provisions of the law," reads Article 52 of the 2004 Afghan Constitution. The accomplishments made over the past two decades are now in jeopardy due to the political transition that have taken place in mid-August 2021 and the temporary suspension of funding for the health system from the World Bank and other donors.

This fund pausing interrupted many critical infrastructure projects including in the health sector. It led to the immediate suspension of projects and payment of salaries and running costs.

The Shuhada Organization has been assisting Afghans in need in a variety of fields, particularly health, for more than three decades. In 1993, SO built its first hospital in the most remote part of the Jaghori district of Ghazni province and since then, it has expanded its health services in other underserved areas of Afghanistan through establishment of hospitals and health clinics.

This organization has provided health facilities for a number of 5,847,132 individuals since its establishment where 232,366 individuals (female: 139,420 – male: 92,946) have been provided health services in 2022. See detailed projects of 2022 in below:



1 Shuhada District Hospital Jaghori

Shuhada District Hospital in Jaghori is located in Sang-e-Masha (Jaghori district center) and has operated by SO Since 1993. The hospital is providing a wide range of healthcare services and is available around-the-clock to residents of Jaghori as well as the nearby districts of Malistan, Nahor, Qarabagh, Gelan, and the provinces of Zabul and Orazgan. Jaghori district is bordered with Nahor, Qara Bagh, Moqoor, Gelan, Malistan districts of Ghazni province and Arghandab district of Zabul province from the south-west. It is situated in the highlands on the southern fringes of the Hazarajat region. It occupies 1,855 km2 in the upper Arghandab valley. It is 127.7 km far from the center of Ghazni province, and 274.1 km far from Kabul.

Brief information about WHO support to Shuhada District Hospital Jaghori

In order to take advantage of any prospects for enhancing Shuhada District Hospital's healthcare system, the hospital has taken the initiative to maintain its relationships with governmental organizations, as well as other national and international organizations, over the past several years.

Fortunately, the World Health Organization (WHO) expressed interest in offering Shuhada Hospital some medical equipment and supplies. The World Health Organization (WHO) supported medical devices like the Portable Ventilator, Portable Suction Unit, Operation Table, Infusion Pump, Digital Portable Electrocardiograph, Oxygen Concentrator, Folding Screen, and Foldable Stretcher, as well as some other various types of beneficial medications, like; injections, tablets, solutions, syrup, and so forth. Additionally, the WHO provided helpful surgical supplies and dressings. In addition to this assistance, WHO also provides potable water by drilling a water well in the hospital's yard.

















2 Kamatti Health Sub-Center

Kamatti Health Sub-Center is located in Kamatti village of Bamyan center. It is 35 km far from Bamyan center. The nearest health center to this village is 20 km. The village is in a mountainous area with a harsh climate in the winter season.


During heavy snowfall in winter, the road of the village to Bamyan center is blocked. Since there is no regular transportation system and no good road to Bamyan center, having a functional health center to address the basic health care is a dire need of the Kamatti community members.

Kamatti Health Sub-Center covers a large number of people in the area. It provides health services to three community development councils, 12 villages which are located among harsh mountains, and 900 vulnerable families. According to United Nations Fund for Population Activity (UNFPA) statistics in 2016, the average household size is 7.3. So, population of the clinic coverage area is 6,570 individuals.

Kamatti Health Sub-Center was established by SO with the financial support of HCS in 2010. They have been continuing their support since 2010 so far.

The health center operates on its outpatients (delivery health services, such as; routine examinations, dressing, injection, reproductive health care and family planning services to patients) and includes a checkup room, delivery room, dressing room and one free medical store.

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3 Golistan Health Sub-Center


Golistan Health Sub-Center is located in Golistan village of Bamyan center. It is about 30 km far from the center of the Bamyan province. The nearest health center is about 8km. The village is in a mountainous area with a harsh climate in the winter season and its road to Bamyan center is blocked in the winter due to heavy snowfall.

Since there is no regular transportation system and no good road to Bamyan center, having a functional health center to address the basic health cares is a dire need for Golistan community members. Golistan Health Sub-Center covers a part of Bamyan population in the area. It provides health services to one Community Development Council as a whole and provides health services to three other surrounding CDCs participants as well. It has 2 villages which containing 70 families.

According to vaccination statistics this village has a number of 700 populations. Golistan Health Sub-Center was established by SO with financial support of HCS in 2012. They have been continuing their support since 2012 so far.

The clinic is operating on its outpatients (delivery health services, such as routine examinations, dressing, injection, reproductive health care and family planning services to patients) and has a checkup room, delivery room, dressing room and one free medical store with one year's worth of supplies.

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4 Mesh Health Sub-Center


Mesh Health Sub-Center is located in Nili center of Daikundi province. It is 20 km far from center of Nili and 20 km far from its surrounding health centers.

The road to center of Daikundi province and other surrounding health centers are very bad and the road is blocked completely by heavy snow fall in winter to traveling to center of the province and surrounding health centers.

Mesh Health Sub-Center covers a part of population in Nili district. It provides health services to a number of 3 Community Development Councils (CDCs) which contain 28 villages. It has a number of 350 families. According to UNFPA the average household in Afghanistan is 7.3. So, 350 will be multiplied by 7.3 and the total of which becomes 2555 individuals.

SO has established this clinic in the area with financial support of HCS in August 2015. They have been continuing their support so far. The clinic is operating on its outpatients (delivery health services, such as routine examinations, dressing, injection, reproductive health care and family planning services) and has a check-up room, delivery room, dressing room.

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5 Poshtroq Health Sub-Center


Poshtroq village is in Khidir district of Daikundi province which is located north-west of Daikunid province. It has 14 sub-villages with 4,865 people, four Community Development Councils (CDCs).

The nearest health center to this village is 35km (Khidir district hospital). It is far from Nili center of Daikundi province about 58km in summer and about 95km in winter. SO with financial support of HCS has established Poshtrog Health Sub-Center on 1st May 2019.

They have been continuing to provide health services to the community members from 1st May 2019 onward.

The clinic is operating on its outpatients (delivery health services, such as; routine examinations, dressing, injection, reproductive health care and family planning services to patients) and has a checkup room, delivery room, dressing room and one free medical store with one year worth of supplies.

6 Chochan Health Sub-Center

Chochan Health Sub-Center is located in Chochan village of Shahristan district of Daikundi province. It is 26 km far from its surrounding health centers. This health center is 36 km far from center of the district. The health center is 95 km far from center of the province.


50 km of the road from this health center to center of Daikundi is very bad and the remaining parts of the road are good. The people do not have easy access to surrounding health centers particularly in the winter due to lack of proper road and heavy snow fall.

Chochan Health Sub-Center covers a large number of populations in this area. It provides health services to a number of 12 Community Development Councils which is containing 14 large villages. The villages cover a number of 450 families.

According to UNFPA, average of household number in Afghanistan is 7.3. To break it to single unit of individual, numbers of families are multiplied by 7.3 the total of which makes 4573 individuals. SO has established this health center on September 1, 2017 by financial support of HCS. They have been continuing their support to the community members so far.

The clinic is operating on its outpatients (delivery health services, such as routine examinations, dressing, injection, reproductive health care, family planning, vaccination and services to patients) and has a checkup room, delivery room, dressing room and one free medical store with one year worth of supplies.

7 Char Aspan Health Sub-Center

Char Aspan Health Sub-Center is located in Char Aspan village of Shahristan district of Daikundi province. It is 25 km far from its surrounding health centers, 55 km far from center of the district and 35 km far from center of the province.


It is a remote area with no access to healthcare facilities but sometime mobile clinics go to the village and visit the patients.

Char Aspan Health Sub-Center covers a part of Shahristan population in the area. It provides health services to a number of 15 Community Development Councils which containing of 27 villages. The villages cover a number of 1000 families.

According to UNFPA, average household of the Afghan is 7.3. So, the total population of this health center will be a number of 7,300 individuals. SO has run this health center since January 2018 with financial support of HCS. They have been continuing their supports to provide health services to the community members since January 2018 onward.

This health center is operating on its outpatients (delivery health services, such as routine examinations, dressing, injection, reproductive health care and family planning services) and it has a check-up room, delivery room, and dressing room as well.

8 Bed Nahur Health Sub-Center


Sabz Sang-i-Bed village of Nahur district in Ghazni province is a far village with no access to healthcare facilities; sometimes mobile clinics have a visit there. The nearest health center is almost 20km far from the area and it is the Comprehensive Health Clinic of Khawad. Most of the people travel on foot or animals due to harsh roads and poverty.

The population of the village is approximately 5,500 individuals (according to Health Department of Ghazni province). SO with financial support of HCS has established Bed health Sub-Center in the mentioned area at the beginning of 2020.

The local people provided a house for the health center and SO provided the equipment and staff members (1 nurse, 1 midwife, 1 vaccinator, and two service staff).

The clinic is operating on its outpatients (delivery health services, such as routine examinations, dressing, injection, reproductive health care and family planning services to patients) and has a checkup room, delivery room, dressing room and one free medical store with one year worth of supplies.



Child Protection Orphanages



Shuhada Organization (SO) has established three orphanages under the title of Samar Orphanages, two in Jaghori district of Ghazni province and one in the center of Bamyan province, where a number of 387 children were supported with appropriate accommodation, food, education, and health services since its establishment.



Protection/Orphanages

Unfortunately, decades of war in Afghanistan have led the children know nothing but violence and fear. However, it is hard to lose the closest family members and the life without the head of the family is indescribable. In addition, the collapse of the previous regime on 15th August 2021 has increased the difficulties to new levels. The orphan children are frequently treated as household employees due to the extremely poor economic situation of the average family in the area.

Orphans are frequently utilized as unpaid child labour and endure economic exploitation for the rest of their life. These unlucky children come from impoverished households that are frequently unable to afford to send them to school or, in rare instances, make no effort to do so.

Orphan girls are particularly vulnerable and frequently pressured to marry at a young age by whoever their family decides for them (the choice often involves monetary transactions).

Shuhada Organization (SO) has established three orphanages under the title of Samar Orphanages, two in Jaghori district of Ghazni province and one in the center of Bamyan province, where a number of 387 children were supported with appropriate accommodation, food, education, and health services since its establishment, from which a number of 13 children (girls: 8 – boys: 5) have been newly covered by the orphanages in 2022.

192 (Female: 79 - Male: 113) orphans are currently being supported by SO at Samar Orphanages. See projects detail as below:



Samar Orphanages in Jaghori and Bamyan:

In 2022, the three orphanages operated by the Shuhada organization in the provinces of Bamyan and Ghazni served 192 (79 girls and 113 boys) orphans and widows.

Eight teachers (three female and five male) oversee these three orphanages, together with three male supervisors and fifteen supporting staff. These orphanages have year-round public school attendance for children.

Additional permanent teachers are hired to assist the kids with their schoolwork as well as to encourage and point them in the direction of extracurricular activities like anthropology, drama, literature, painting, cuisine, knitting, athletics, and regular English and computer classes. However,

SO makes sure that all orphans complete their 12th grade school education and take the university entrance exam. See what SO accomplished throughout these 20 years of child protection efforts below:

- 1. In 2022, 11 children (girls 8 and boys 3) graduated from high schools and a total of 104 children (Girls: 46 Boys: 58) graduated from high schools since 2009.
- 2. In 2022, a number of 3 girls and 3 boys got admission to public and private universities and some institute of arts and science. A total of 72 individuals (Girls: 25 boys: 47) got admission to universities since 2009.
- 3. Since 2014 up to 2022, 34 individuals (girls: 11 boys 23) graduated from universities and institutes.
- 4. A number of 13 children (girls: 8 boys: 5) have been newly covered by the orphanages in 2022
- 5. A number of 17 girls got married since the establishment of the orphanages.

EDUCATION



SO has operated 97 schools since its foundation mostly for girls, literacy programmes for women, teacher trainings and higher education scholarship for girls.



The protracted civil war and security turmoil have destroyed Afghanistan's infrastructure and educational system. However, despite these factors, there has been significant success in enrollment at all educational levels. The number of students have increased from roughly 1 million in 2001 to almost 10 million in 2018, and the number of girls enrolled in primary school has increased from virtually zero in 2001 to 2.5 million in 2018.

Along with unimaginable human sacrifices since the (IEA) took power in August 2021, the crisis has the potential to undo a lot of the development advancements gained during those 20 years. The Afghan people have already suffered greatly as a result of forty years of war, frequent natural disasters, severe poverty, drought, and the COVID-19 pandemic.

A severe risk of systemic collapse and a humanitarian disaster currently exists in the nation as a result of an unparalleled humanitarian crisis. The right of Afghan children and young people to education has been severely impacted. 1.1 million secondary school girls have been barred from attending secondary school until further notice since 23 March 2022.

Young women pursuing higher education have also been negatively impacted by the current crisis, with a 60% drop in enrollment being noted. Education is the only thing that can help Afghanistan to avoid further disaster and overcome its current obstacles.

Shuhada Organization has made a significant contribution to promoting education and supporting youth; particularly girls, by establishing, building, and renovating more than 136 school buildings. SO has operated 97 schools since its foundation mostly for girls, literacy programmes for women, teacher trainings and higher education scholarship for girls. While 3,988 (female: 2,667 - male: 1,321) higher education and other educational programs students in provinces were benefited since the organization establishment.

Overall 226,038 individuals have benefited from SO's education projects in the last 34 years. See detailed projects of 2022 as below:



1 Scholarship Program funded by CAFS

Since 2014, the Comitato Arghosha Faraway School (CAFS) has partnered with the Shuhada Organization to help the education of girls in Afghanistan.

Through the CAFS scholarship programme and support, many girls were able to finish their higher education in the professions they desired. Most of them would not have been able to finance their higher education costs and would not have graduated as they have today if they had not been given financial support. It is all a result of the devoted CAFS team's sincere work with its implementing partner (IP), the SO.

It is almost about 9 years that CAFS is supporting the determined Afghan girls to pursue their higher studies in different universities in Kabul city. Many girls have benefited from this opportunity and completed their university studies (i.e. bachelor degrees) and many other are benefiting at the moment doing their bachelor and master degrees.

The scholarship project is seen by CAFS and SO as an addition to the long-term efforts to support the development of educational infrastructure. Furthermore, it is view as a little but vital investment that will have a huge and positive impact on the country's poorest areas: the development of human resources.

29 high school graduates have received scholarships since 2014 to pursue higher education in the fields of engineering, business administration, computer science, law/political science, and medicine (Midwifery) at private universities. In addition, they are provided computers and English courses to have better access to the internet to be connected to the technological world and being updated with the current era. As a result, 29 girls in all have so far benefited from the advantages of scholarships.

In 2022, three bursary holders who were introduced to private universities have successfully got BA degrees in Computer Science and Economics & Management.

Provision of Drinking Water for Lazir girl's school in Nili City of Daikundi Province

Lazir Girl's Secondary School was built with financial support of CAFS and through facilitation of Shuhada Organization in 2021. The school building is an eight classroom, typical school building with 4 admin rooms and 5 latrines.

The school's drinking water supply was delayed last year as a result of the recent droughts in the region. The school's shortage of drinking water caused numerous issues for the pupils, but happily, in the middle of 2022, the community agreed to donate a nearby water stream to the school.

The Comitato Arghosha Faraway School (CAFS) provided the fund for water supply of the school and the project started in September 2022. The practical work of the project on the site was started on 25th September through cleaning of the water stream and digging of the ground for water pipes.

The ground was excavated about 40-50 cm deep for covering the water pipe to be save from freezing during winter season. A water storage/reservoir with a capacity of 4500 liters of water made from R.C.C concrete.

The water storage walls and floor were plastered from outside and inside with anti-moisture or waterproof materials and two codes of color with a filter that the water is filtered before entering the storage. Eight panels of Solar with all its equipment are installed for electricity usage of the Water pump, to pump the water from the water stream to the water tank storage.

Three water faucets, one in front of the school near the east gate, the second one near the south gate, and the third one near the latrines, were made for taking water. On 15th November 2022, the drinking water supply project of Lazir School is officially handed over to school authorities and Daikundi Education Department.





Provision of Student Desks for two schools in Bamyan and Daikundi

The importance of school furniture is undeniable. It plays a significant role in the effectiveness of student learning. The school furniture contributes to the comfort, posture and support of students, all of which contributes positively towards students' ability to concentrate and work. Classroom furniture is key to high performing students from a young age. UNESCO highlights this very fact in their report.

But unfortunately in Afghanistan there are many schools that students sit on the ground and do not have any furniture at all even for teachers. The primary goal of the project was to supply student desks for two schools, one in the provinces of Bamyan and the other in Daikundi, that adhere to the standards set by the Education Ministry. Within two months, the project was completed with success. 232 school Desks for students were expertly made in the Bamyan Center. 112 desks were delivered to Feroz Bahar High School in Yakawlang district of Bamyan province, while 120 desks were made for Sang-i-Moom Girl's High School in Nili city of Daikundi province.

4 Scholarship Program funded by Focus Women Foundation

Afghanistan experienced significant setbacks in the field of education in 2021, including the COVID-19 outbreak and a massive change in the country's political structure.

Two decades of war conducted by the US and its allied forces against the (IEA) ended in August 2021 with the (IEA) return to power in Afghanistan.

If precedents are any indication, the Afghan education sector is one of the key sectors set to be severely affected under (IEA) rule, risking the loss of advancements made since 2001. This is also evident in the (IEA) actions regarding Afghan educational institutions and universities—which have caused widespread dissatisfaction among many Afghans. Being a woman in Afghanistan is difficult, the lowest literacy rates are among women and girls, who are also the most vulnerable and disenfranchised. There aren't enough public universities for

women, and private universities are frequently out of reach financially.

It can be difficult for high school graduates to afford their university education. The female students claim that they are struggling with poverty since they lost their employment recently or that their family's income fell as a result of the current situation and they are unable to pay for their higher education. With the support of its donors, Shuhada has a long history of promoting girls' education.

In order to motivate existing female university students to pursue higher study and offer them new hope in these difficult times, this scholarship programme paid for all of their university fees with financial support of Focus Women Foundation.

45 female students who newly joined the university are totally supported with their tuition costs until they graduate, together with 574 female students who were in different semesters in 2022.



Women Economic Empowerment



Since its establishment, Shuhada has given livestock/sheep to 1082 families, which in 2022, it provided sheep to 50 families which includes 410 people (219 women and 191 men).



One of the world's poorest nation is Afghanistan. It has been the location of a number of wars that have lasted for more than four decades since the Soviet invasion in 1979.

Afghanistan has severe poverty in both its urban and rural areas. However, the country's civil war primarily affected women and children.

Families lost their young sons, male peers, and breadwinners as a result of the protracted conflict. Women and families with young children are therefore the most vulnerable members of society. The majority of the time, they are starving and lack a loaf of bread to feed their kids.

However, since 1989, Shuhada has made an effort to adequately engage the community about the project and solicit their help in selecting the most disadvantaged families in the area to be the recipients of the initiatives.

Afghanistan's remotest areas and most disadvantaged households have traditionally benefited from the projects.

Since its establishment, Shuhada has given livestock/sheep to 1082 families, which in 2022, it provided sheep to 50 families which includes 410 people (219 women and 191 men).

The projects' details are as follows:

Economic Empowerment of Women-Headed and Vulnerable Families in Waras District of Bamyan

The Shuhada Organization (SO) implemented a project titled "economic empowerment of women-headed and vulnerable families through sheep distribution" in Waras district of Bamyan province where economically very poor people live there.

In continuation of many other projects, the SO distributed 100 sheep and 100 lambs for 25 families in the first phase of the project that each family received 4 sheep along 4 lambs.

Then in the second phase of the project 6 other families will be benefited from the project which each family will receive 4 sheep and 4 lambs.

The main purpose of this project was economic empowerment of 31 women and vulnerable families through provision of livestock.

This project was funded by the Help Committee Schaffhausen (HCS) and implemented by SO team. The project was deisigned to fulfill the needs of the targeted families in the community with close coordination of the community members.

Before the implementation of this project, the targeted families were provided with sufficient information through awareness session about the sheep keeping and sheep rearing by a veterinarian.

Moreover, all the distributed sheep got vaccinated and the beneficiares were given some medicines for the sheeps to have for any emergency.

They were guided and advised on usage of the medicines for the sheep, and on sheep keeping/rearing.

This livestock project impacted the beneficiaries' life positively. In addition, to using its dairy product and wool; some jobs were also created for them.

Therefore, they got able to send their children to school and could afford to pay their children's school expenses.

It is also mentionable that the people who benefited from this project and are living in this district; shared their gratitude to the donor, implementing organization and other members involved in this project.



Economic Empowerment of Women-Headed and Vulnerable Families in Punjab District of Bamyan

The Shuhada Organization (SO) implemented another project to empower the vulnerable families economically. The project titled "economic empowerment of women-headed and vulnerable families through sheep distribution" in Punjab district of Bamyan province where economically vulnerable and most in need people live there.

The SO distributed sheep with its lambs for 25 families that each family received 4 sheep along its 4 lambs.

The main purpose of this project was economic empowerment of women and vulnerable families through provision of livestock. This project was funded by the Help Committee Schaffhausen (HCS) and implemented by SO team.

The beneficiaries were happy and thankful to the donor and implementing organization. The families who benefited from this project, are able to support themselves in terms of living and other additional expenses through the sheep products they get and by sheep rearing.

This project also will be implemented in two phases. 25 families were covered in the first phase, and 6 other families will be covered in the second phase, in total 31 families will be benefited.

Moreover, the implementing organization conducted an awareness session to provide the beneficieries with the knowledge of keeping and rearing the sheep. The beneficiaries were also given with some medicines for the sheep to keep with them and use it if any emergency case happened with the sheep.

They were also guided on the medicines usage and were emphasized to do their level best for providing a good keeping/rearing environment for the sheep.



Capacity Building

In today's fast-changing world, it is needed to develop skills and enhance the abilities of an individual or a group for a better and quality performance. Therefore, the SO has always strived to provide the opportunities for capacity building development. In addition; it is known that the international calls emphasize on the importance of capacity building in the developing countries. Most of the organizations have this program as one of its objective to be achieved.

Moreover, in order to have positive and effective results in the working environment and to have quality projects implementation; so far, the SO conducted many and various workshops/trainings in more than 30 provinces of Afghanistan for more than 30,800 trainees in different fields, such as; human resources management, human rights, democracy, gender, public speaking skills, leadership, monitoring and evaluation (M&E), financial management, report writing, proposal writing, nursing, traditional birth attendance, professional teacher trainings, music classes for youth and vocational training for women-headed households and poor families, since its establishment within 34 years.

SO has also conducted capacity-building projects in 2022 where 47 people were the direct beneficiaries of the project. Overall 30,921 individuals benefited from SO capacity building program within 34 years. You can see the details about SO's capacity buildings in 2022 as below:

Financial Management & QuickBooks Training

This capacity building program was organized to improve the skills of some employees of SO in both theoretical and practical areas of financial management and QuickBooks.

On the other hand, in this workshop most of the important points regarding accounting, financial management, procurement and logistic were taught to the technical and non-technical staff of the main and provincial offices present in this workshop.

In addition; this workshop was helping the trainees to understand the different steps and procedures involved in accounting and financial management.

The trainees enhanced their knowledge and understandings regarding the aforementioned points mentioned above. Last but not the least, it is worth to mention that this informative workshop was organized by the Shuhada Organization (SO) and took place in the main office of SO in Kabul-Afghansitan.



3 Twinning Program 2

"In 2015, ACBAR, was funded by the UK's Department for International Development (DFID), started a program to build the capacity of NNGOs through training, mentoring and cooperative activities in partnership with ACBAR's INGO members.

Additional support from UNOCHA was required to successfully meet the overarching outcome for the program as planned that "Capacity building of NNGOs would contribute to system-wide gains in humanitarian delivery in Afghanistan.

Due to the demonstrated success of the first Twinning Programme which ended 31 March 2019, ACBAR was funded by DFID again to continue the effort to improve NNGO's humanitarian capabilities.

The Twinning Programme 2, DFID project, started on 1 August 2019 and is planned to continue through 31 March 2024. In 2020, DFID became part of the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO).

The program now includes both I/NGOs (Advisor) and NNGOs (TP2 NNGO Partner) that have met requirements as Advisors to mentor NNGO twinning partners.

The #1 outcome of the program is to help the NNGOs to become part of the Afghanistan Humanitarian Fund partner base.

The #2 outcome is to encourage and participate in partnerships." In 2022, one of the SO staff participated in a 3 days training organized by ACBAR regarding the logical framework, communities and disasters, and AAP.

The SO successfully completed the 3 days training, graduated and awarded graduation certificate by ACBAR."



HUMANITARIAN AID



Shuhada implemented five humanitarian aid programs in 2022, covering more than 2,163 families consist of almost 17,256 individuals in various provinces of Afghanistan.



Afghanistan remains one of the world's worst humanitarian crises. Millions of Afghans more than half of the population need humanitarian aid as a result of decades of conflict, frequent calamities, chronic poverty, drought, severe food insecurity, and the COVID-19 pandemic. For more than a year, Afghanistan has seen extreme level of hunger. According to the World Food Programme (WFP), 90% of Afghans consume insufficient amounts of food. Afghanistan was one of the largest and most complicated humanitarian crises in the world even before the (IEA) took control in August 2021 and foreign military and diplomatic missions withdrew. There are still a lot of unmet humanitarian needs more than a year after the withdrawal.

Over the course of more than three decades of operation, the Shuhada organization and its financial partners have always stood by the Afghan people and held their hands when they were struggling. Shuhada helped numerous Afghan families in need during the civil war in the 1990s through emergency humanitarian relief initiatives, and still runs the aid programs for those in the most need all over Afghanistan with support of its kind donors.

In 2021 only, 475 women-headed and economically challenged families in four Afghan provinces received assistance. Shuhada implemented five humanitarian aid programs in 2022, covering more than 2,163 families consist of almost 17,256 individuals in various provinces of Afghanistan. Below are the details of the programs. In total till the end of 2022, 217,523 people are benefited from humanitarian aid of SO since its establishment.



1 Humanitarian Aid for Extremely Vulnerable Afghan Families

The Shuhada organization implemented a humanitarian aid project for extremely poor families in early 2022.

The project was funded by Comitato Arghosha Faraway School (CAFS). This project covered five hundred households who were extremely in need of support in four provinces of Afghanistan.

The project aim was to assess the vulnerable families economically in order to be contributed and enabling them economically through cash distribution as most of them were women-headed and vulnerable families.

The Shuhada organization with its financial partners always stood by the Afghan people and held their hands in hard times since its establishment as it is done during its more than 3 decades of service.

The SO is committed to stand and continue its support to the people of Afghanistan with the financial support of its kind partners and donors.

3 Humanitarian Aid for Extremely Vulnerable Afghan Families

Since the US withdrawal and fall of Afghanistan in August 2021, the country has endured a deepening and increasingly deadly humanitarian crisis. Acute malnutrition was spiking across the country and 95 percent of households have been experiencing insufficient food consumption and food insecurity.

The Afghanistan current economy is facing a plethora of challenges especially after the regime changed in Afghanistan and suspension/cracking down of the international community aid and assistance.

On the other hand, the women who have lost their breadwinners in wars and suicide attacks, are illiterate, and do not have access to governmental jobs, they are suffering the most.

The homeless women who used to clean and launder in other citizens' homes, are housewives and most of them have become dependent on charitable donations.

The main purposes of this project were, first; to assess the most vulnerable Afghan families who are facing difficulties economically and secondly; to support the 475 women-headed and the most in-need families through the cash distribution in four provinces of Afghanistan.

The Shuhada Organization (SO) with the financial support of its kind hearted partners always stood by the Afghan people and supported them in difficult times during its more than 3 decades of sincere services in different parts of Afghanistan.

This project was funded by Partners Releif and Development. The benefited families were very happy and thankful for such a generous support.



Monitoring & Evaluation of the Projects

For a project to be completed on time, on budget, and within Scope, monitoring, and Evaluation are crucial. Monitoring and Evaluation procedures find project plan deviations. Monitoring and Evaluating a project makes sure that performance is smooth, effective, and on schedule.

Monitoring and Evaluation are integral parts of an organization.

Therefore, the Shuhada organization has an independent Department of Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) to monitor all SO activities.

The activities should be on track according to the work plan and proposal.

Besides the regular monitoring of the SO M&E department, teams of senior management from Shuhada main office in Kabul under the direct supervision of Deputy Director also check and monitor the projects twice a year.

The team visits all the projects and talks with the project staff and beneficiaries. Meet with the local community and talk about the impact of the project in their area and discuss the ways of project improvement.

A comprehensive report made by the team and presented to the management board which includes all feedback, suggestion, and challenges of all the projects. All the appropriate feedback and suggestions are considered in the meeting and decisions are made.





She believes that until someone is not educated, he/she cannot overcome the hurdles easily.



Before, when we had no sheep, we had no income from this source and my children had no access to milk/yogurt too, but fortunately now we have and the sheep fulfil the basic needs of my family", said Qamar.

SHARIFA, MIDWIFE

Sharifa Amiri is from Daikundi province of Afghanistan. She is working as a midwife at "Mesh Health Sub Center" in Daikundi. "There was no school in my village until an organization constructed a school there.

I got married in a very early age when I was 7th grade at school and then had my baby. It was very difficult for me to overcome all the problems I had, such as; house work, taking care of my baby and continuing my studies", said Sharifa. She is a mother who in spite of taking care of her three babies; giving efforts to help the most in need and poor families through midwifery, in particular the pregnant women. Sharifa is very thankful to the Help Committee Schaffhausen (HCS) for supporting the Mesh Health Sub Center and enabling the vulnerable families to have access to the health services.

Those who are giving birth, this clinic is very helpful for them in particular. Before, till reaching to the center of the province, the pregnant women were losing their babies due to a long distance and mountainous routes to the city where hospitals/clinics were located, Sharifa added. When Sharifa gets up, she makes the breakfast for her family and sends her big child to school. Then, she herself goes to clinic and works there from morning to the late afternoon. She feels so good serving the very poor and really in need people.

This clinic impacted the people positively as previously the people were going to the city, it was remote and challenging especially in the winter and the health centers were too far, said Sharifa. In addition, she said; that the clinic has a positive impact on her personal life too as she is working there, getting paid and supporting her family through her profession.





FERIBA, VULNERABLE

Feriba Samar is 14 years old and living in Samar Orphanage Bamyan. She is basically from Yakawlang NO.2 of Bamyan.

Her father has mental illness and separated from her mother. Feriba entered the orphanage when she was 10 years old.

She started going to school when she entered the orphanage. She is 5th grade at school at the moment.

The Samar orphanage in Bamyan is getting support from Help Committee Schaffhausen (HCS) and is the home for many vulnerable boys and girls.

Feriba is happy to be in the orphanage as she had no place to live and continue her life. She is very thankful to HCS and SO for providing such an opportunity for her and many other girls and boys like her.

"I was really in a bad situation before and I was not allowed to go to school.

But now I am very happy for being in such a place that I have no worries for having no money or other stuff like dress and etc.

I want to be a doctor in the future because being a doctor is the only desire I have. When I grown up, I understood to study and it would help me and my community. I really love being a doctor", Said Feriba.




